





UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT BY RACE/ETHNICITY (HEADCOUNT)



Percent of resident students in different racial/ethnic groups








COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENT BY RACE/ETHNICITY (HEADCOUNT)






COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENT BY RACE/ETHNICITY (HEADCOUNT)






UNIVERSITY DEGREES BY RACE/ETHNICITY

Number of degrees awarded to students in racial/ethnic groups




Number of degrees awarded to students who are white






COMMUNITY COLLEGE ASSOCIATE DEGREES BY RACE/ETHNICITY






Percentage of first-time, full-time freshmen at public universities who complete a bachelor's degree within 6 years










IPEDS percentage of students completing certificate or degree






